## Baden Volunteer Fire Department



The Baden Fire Department is looking for new applicants. If you or someone you know, who resides in Baden Borough are interested in joining the Baden Volunteer Fire Department, we'd like to hear from you.

The Fire Department was formed in 1908, and since has provided a committed service to Baden residents and surrounding communities. We are staffed with dedicated volunteers who have felt the calling of serving their community, by donating their time and talents to help keep the residents of Baden safe. Becoming a member is extremely rewarding. Applicants must be 18 years of age, and are NOT required to have any experience prior to the application process. For anyone between the ages of 14 and 18, the department hosts a Junior Firefighter Program.

There are some things you may want to consider before beginning the application process:

- Do I have reliable transportation to and from the department for calls,

functions, and fundraisers?

- Am I willing to attend regularly scheduled training and meetings?
- Am I able to attend fundraising and special events or training?

If you can answer 'YES' to those questions, you should begin the application process!

Each candidate must first begin by completing a paper application. Once the application is received, along with your \$10 payment (application fee + member dues), the Board of Directors will set up an appointment for a formal interview. During the interview the applicant will be given detailed information pertaining to expectations and responsibilities of each member. An opportunity for questions will be available with several department leaders.

Benefits of membership include:

**Free Training:** The department provides in-house training 2 times per month (3, if on probation), and also sponsors members to attend approved training at outside venues.

### Personal Protective Equipment:

The department provides all necessary PPE (probationary and active member turn-out gear), as well as Life Insurance, Workman's Comp, and Disability Insurance if injured in the Line of Duty.

Serving your community as a volunteer firefighter is a noble and rewarding experience.

Applications are available in the Borough office, or at the FD. Feel free to stop by the first or fourth Thursday of each month if interested.

# A Message from Our Mayor...

Baden Residences,

Baden Borough streets have many pedestrian crosswalks. Pennsylvania State Law Title 75, Section 102 defines "crosswalk" as follows:

- That part of a roadway at an intersection included within the connections of the lateral lines of the sidewalks on opposite sides of the highway, measured from the curbs or, in the absence of curbs, from the edges of the traversable roadway; and in the absence of a sidewalk on one side of the roadway, that part of the roadway included within the extension of the lateral lines of the existing sidewalk.
- Any portion of a roadway at an intersection or elsewhere distinctly indicated for pedestrian crossing by lines or other markings on the surface.

Vehicles responsibility and penalties violating pedestrians crosswalks:

At non-controlled intersections, vehicles shall yield the right-of-way to pedestrians in a marked or unmarked crosswalk Sec 3542(a)

Penalty for violations Sec3542(a):

- Fine of \$50.00 plus costs
- 2 points on license

Vehicle compliance at all pedestrians crosswalks are vital to the safety and wellbeing of our citizens.

## Beaver County Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)

The Borough has received an \$84,000 grant through the 2018 CDBG to fund a waterline distribution loop on Berry Street. This project will not take place until next year.

To receive the funding Baden Borough had to meet specific criteria because the CDBG funding supports activities that will benefit low-income individuals through improved housing, better employment opportunities, improved public facilities, provision of a better quality of life and support of activities that will eliminate or prevent conditions of slum and blight in a community.

Specifically, they strive to carry out projects that will extend or replace water and sewer lines, rehabilitate roads and streets, rehabilitate and renovate public and private housing and other non-residential public or private buildings, revitalize and improve downtown business districts and provide incentives and programs related to job creation.

To achieve the goals of the CDBG Program, Title I of The Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, establishes three primary conditions or criteria, any of which must be met before funds can be utilized to support an activity. These are called CDBG National Primary Objectives.

**A CDBG project must do one or more of the following:**

- Benefit low to moderate income persons
- Prevent or eliminate a condition of slum or blight
- Address a situation creating a threat to the health and safety of residents that has occurred in the last 18 months and for which there is no other source of funding available to carry out the activity

The latter criteria is almost never used to qualify or make an activity eligible for funding under the CDBG Program because of the very stringent requirements that must be met according to applicable regulations. This criterion is used primarily in qualifying activities that would correct or repair problems resulting from major disasters.

At the May meeting, the GFWC Woman's Club of Baden installed Shelly Smolnery as President, Lesabeth Trczianka as Vice President, Geri Fabinich as Secretary and Cathy Gulish as Treasurer. The theme for this administration is "Go the extra mile... It's never crowded."

Each meeting includes a program of interest to the members. This year's programs include a visit to Fire Station 47, a speaker from The Women's Shelter, a local children's book author and several other topics. Funds raised are used to help support the Baden Fire Department, Baden Library, Baden Food Bank, the three churches as well as international programs such as Heifer International, Operation



Smile, St. Jude's Children's Hospital, Canine Companions and the USO.

The club will participate in The GFWC Pennsylvania State Presidents Project "Step It Up... Volunteer".

Club members will keep track of the steps they take through the club year to improve individual health. The club will also focus on assisting the Woman's Center of Beaver County through various drives and will be educated on domestic violence issues. The club meets the last Tuesday of the month at 6:30 PM at the Baden Community room. New members are always welcome. ## Economy Ambulance Service - 44 Years of Service



Economy Ambulance Service is beginning their 44th year of service. They have been the designated provider of Emergency Medical Service to the town of Baden since 1997. Besides providing Emergency Medical Services to the residents, they also are very active in other events in the community. Economy Ambulance sponsored three blood drives collecting 98 units of blood and plasma. Economy Ambulance did several CPR Classes for residents as well as Stroke Awareness and Rapid assessment. We also do First Aid and CPR classes for our police and fire departments in the event they are first to arrive at emergency calls. Your ambulance service stood by at Two 5K races at Old Economy Park. One was the Big Dog 5K Run, which raises money for Huntington's Disease research. The other was The Will of the Warrior Run, which supports Veterans and First Responders who suffer from PTSD. Economy EMS even received an invitation to a birthday party where the four year old had asked all of her guests to bring items to support local Fire, Police and EMS Services. Economy Ambulance came away with cases of water, Gatorade and other snacks.

# STORMWATER MANAGEMENT: Understanding the MS4 Program

## What is the MS4 Program?

Untreated or uncontrolled storm water runoff is the number one cause of impairment in our local waterways. Polluted runoff is often transported through municipal drainage systems until it eventually discharges into streams, lakes, and rivers untreated. An MS4, or Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System, is comprised of drainage systems, including streets, catch basins, curbs, gutters, ditches, man-made channels and storm pipes, owned by a state, county, city, town, township, borough or other public entity. The National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) storm water Phase II regulations require permit coverage for storm water discharges from MS4s, mainly those located in urbanized areas. Therefore, most Townships and Boroughs are required to comply with the MS4 Program.

MS4 Programs are intended to improve our Nation's surface waters by reducing the quantities of pollutants that are picked up by runoff and transported into the storm sewer systems during rainfall events. As part of the MS4 Program, municipalities hold a permit to discharge storm water into local waterways. This permit requires the municipalities to implement and maintain a storm water management program that (1) reduces the discharge of pollutants to the maximum extent possible; (2) protects water quality; and (3) satisfies the water quality requirements of the federal Clean Water Act. In Pennsylvania, the MS4 program is administered by the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP).

The MS4 program has six elements termed "minimum control measures" that when implemented should result in significant reduction in pollutants discharged into receiving waters. The six minimum control measures and the actions required include the following:

1. **Public Education and Outreach** - Distribute educational materials and conduct outreach to inform citizens about the impacts that storm water runoff has on water quality.
2. **Public Participation/Involvement** - Provide opportunities for citizens to participate in the storm water management program or other programs which improve water quality.
3. **Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination** - Develop and implement a plan to detect and eliminate non storm water discharges into the storm water system.
4. **Construction Site Runoff Control** - Develop, implement and enforce an erosion and sediment control program for construction site activities of that disturb one acre or greater.
5. **Post-Construction Runoff Control** - Develop, implement and enforce a program to address discharges of post-construction storm water runoff from new development or redevelopment areas.
6. **Pollution Prevention/Good Housekeeping** - Develop and implement a program that reduces or prevents pollutant runoff from municipal operations

All municipalities should be committed to improving water

quality through better management of stormwater runoff. Every resident and business owner can participate in their municipal stormwater program by reducing or preventing pollutant runoff from their own property and by reporting any non storm water discharges into the municipality's drainage system.

## What can we do to help keep stormwater clean?

There are numerous things we can all do on a daily basis to keep pollution out of our waterways. The following are just a few things we can all do to help improve water quality in our streams, rivers and lakes:

1. Never dump anything into storm drains, swales or streams.
2. Pick up litter from the street before it gets into storm drains.
3. Use limited amounts of fertilizer.
4. If you must use pesticides, search for an environment-friendly brand.
5. Recycle motor oil, paint, and other hazardous chemicals. Never dump such materials down the drain or into the storm system.
6. Recycle glass, plastic, and aluminum.
7. Always pick up your pet's waste or harmful bacteria can get into our water!



## What is an illicit Discharge?

An illicit discharge is the discharge of pollutants or non-storm water materials into a storm sewer system via overland flow, direct dumping, or illicit connections. Illicit connections are pipes or other direct connections that illegally or unknowingly release pollutants or non-storm water materials into a storm sewer system or directly into a body of water. It is up to each municipality to adopt an Ordinance that prohibits illicit discharges into the municipality's storm water system. The Ordinance prohibits any discharge into the municipality's storm sewer system which is not composed entirely of storm water, except as provided below; and discharges approved under a state or federal permit.

## What kinds of discharges are allowed?

Discharges which may be allowed and do not significantly contribute to pollution of surface waters of the Commonwealth, are:

1. Discharges from firefighting activities
2. Discharges from potable water sources not containing chlorine, including dechlorinated water line and fire hydrant flushing.

3. Irrigation drainage.
4. Discharges from routine external building wash down (which does not use detergents or other compounds).
5. Discharges from air conditioning condensate.
6. Discharges from water from individual residential car washing.
7. Springs.
8. Discharges of uncontaminated water from basement or crawl space sump pumps.
9. Discharges of uncontaminated water from foundation or footing drains.
10. Flows from riparian habitats and wetlands.
11. Discharges from lawn watering.
12. Pavement wash waters where spills or leaks of toxic or hazardous materials have not occurred (unless all spill material has been removed) and where detergents are not used.
13. Dechlorinated swimming pool discharges.
14. Discharges from uncontaminated groundwater.
15. Dye testing, but verbal notification must be provided to the Borough Manager prior to the time of the test.

### What types of connections are prohibited?

The following connections are strictly prohibited:

1. Any drainage pipe, channel or ditch, whether on the surface or subsurface, which allows non-storm water discharge, including sewage, process wastewater, and wash water, to enter the storm sewer system, and any connections to the storm drain system from indoor drains and sinks.
2. Roof Drains
  - a. Roof drains shall not be connected to streets, sanitary or storm sewers or roadside ditches, except as provided below.
  - b. When it is more advantageous to connect directly to streets or storm sewers, connection of roof drains to street or roadside ditches may be permitted on a case by case basis by the municipality.
  - c. Roof drains shall discharge to infiltration areas or vegetative BMPs to the maximum extent practical. This will help to promote groundwater recharge and reduce runoff.
3. Waste disposal prohibitions – It is illegal to dispose of or leave any refuse, rubbish, garbage, litter, or other discarded materials in any public or private property, driveway, parking area, street, alley, sidewalk or other component of the municipality's storm sewer system so that such materials may cause or contribute to pollution. Garbage deposited in streets in proper waste receptacles for the purposes of routine collection is exempted from this prohibition.
4. Any drain or pipe connected to the municipality's storm sewer system from a commercial or industrial land use which has not been documented in plans, maps, or equivalent records, and approved by the municipality.

**Register now to receive Beaver County, PA emergency alerts.**

Baden Borough uses Facebook as a quick way to inform residents as to what is happening in the borough. This could be anything from events, utility billing, waterline breaks, trash pickup and even what is happening in surrounding communities. We know everyone does not follow Facebook so in the event of a more serious matter such as water conservation alert that effects all of Baden's residents we ask that you sign up for **SWIFT911**.

Not only does the borough reach out to them to send Baden alerts, the Beaver County, PA emergency alerts **SWIFT911** mass notification system is utilized to alert county residents regarding emergencies such as fires, outages, floods, hurricanes, evacuations and more. Beaver County Emergency Alerts deliver messages via multiple contact methods including voice, text and email.
